

Medieval Munich was divided into four parts, which is why we speak of the city's quarters.





Munich's museums' quarter boasts a unique concentration of high-calibre museums and art galleries. And as if that weren't enough, Kunstareal is embedded in the vibrant Maxvorstadt quarter. Its universities, boutiques, spacious green spaces and historic cafés will tempt you to stroll round, stop off and enjoy life. But the main attraction is still art. With 18 museums and exhibition halls, 42 art galleries and many other cultural institutions, Kunstareal is one of Europe's most important cultural locations — and all this in less than a quarter of a square mile! What better place to be inspired by art than here?



Neuhausen-Nymphenburg The green quarter in the west

Nymphenburg Palace and park are among Munich's top sights. But the charisma of the Bavarian royals' summer residence actually extends far beyond the palace walls. The whole of this quarter is a fairy-tale residential area with impressive villas and old buildings from the Wilhelminian period, small shops and

lively cafés. Half the properties in Neuhausen are listed buildings or ensembles. Besides enjoying this relaxed neighbourhood, there's lots of other things to discover as well – the green paradise of the Botanical Garden, various museums and the largest beer garden in Bavaria. Welcome to a neighbourhood full of light and air!

Giesing

A working-class quarter in transition

Giesing is a truly authentic neighbourhood where they avoid new-fangled things, go to the Boazn (the Munich-style pub) in the evening, and flock to the stadium on Saturdays – but to 1860, not Bayern Munich. Yet this quarter is incredibly lively and diverse – with exciting breweries and bistros, alternative cultural projects and open-air concerts.

Haidhausen A village in the city

Pariser Platz, Orleansplatz, Sedanstraße, Bordeaux-Platz: you might even think you're in France when you're strolling through Haidhausen. Interestingly enough, the locals also refer to this part of the city with its captivating mix of glamorous cosmopolitan flair and village character as the "French Quarter". Here, they know how to appreciate quality without being boastful – and are thus maybe closest to the cosy and diverse lifestyle that typifies Munich.
